KARIBU KENYA! Swahili for Welcome to Kenya!

EDITOR'S NOTE: As Solar Under the Sun prepares to extend its ministry to Kenya, Njoki Mwarumba introduces us to the land of her birth. Today, she lives in Edmond, Okahoma, and is active in efforts to raise living standards in Kenya.

Kenya warmly welcomes Solar Under The Sun. This East African country sits on the equator and is home to extraordinary landmarks such as The Great Rift Valley, renowned phenomenon such as the annual Wildebeest migration, and world class athletes. The country is made up of a rich ethnic diversity adding up to a population estimated at 41 million.

As a developing country, the nation faces multiple challenges typical of the sub-Sahara region. These include low life expectancy, over 50% poverty rate, and high death rates from disease. In 2007-08 post-election violence jarred the otherwise peaceful country, resulting in tremendous loss of life and hundreds of thousands internally displaced from the bitter violence. Kenya depends heavily on hydroelectric power for the provision of electricity. The current system is mired by intermittent and unreliable supply where it is available. The cost of power is prohibitive for many, especially the over 50% living at or below the poverty line. It is within this brief context that Solar Under The Sun initiated its first Kenya outreach, spearheaded by Oklahoma's Synod of the Sun, Cimarron Task Force

Presbytery. Eunice Menja, and I, both Kenyans living in Oklahoma and graduates of Solar School, joined with a Living Waters for the World team on this first trip. LWW has existing partnerships in Kenya, and SUTS evaluation was to determine the possibility for a joint LWW/SUTS project.

The team visited Presbyterian Churches of East Africa (PCEA) sites in Nyeri, Juja, Njoro and Nakuru. The sites included the Tumaini Children's Homes, Milele Resort, among other PCEA church projects. Additional non-church sponsored project sites were also visited for partnership consideration in Juja, where the Mirimaini Primary School sits in a high need location in Juja and power is

desperately needed to support vocational training and special education needs.

In keeping with the Kenyan spirit of "Harambee" where communities come




together to achieve specific goals, Solar Under The Sun and our new Kenyan partners have adopted the Juja Township PCEA Church as the first solar installation site. Juja Township PCEA Church is home to a community school and multiple community projects. These projects include adolescent mentoring programs, basic counseling skill training, justice peace and reconciliation, women and young mother training, and the Board of Social Responsibility that handles provision of basic needs such as food clothing and finances to needy families.

Fundraising efforts are already underway for the first project. Financial support can be made by checks to Solar-Kenya Project, *FPC-Stillwater, and 524 South Duncan Street, Stillwater, OK* 74074-4045. Please also join us in prayer, that the partnerships may draw us all ever closer the real Source of light.
